Sentence Fragments

Not all groups of words are sentences! A **sentence fragment** is a group of words that does not express a complete thought.

1. Sentence Fragment: Practiced the guitar (missing a subject)
2. Sentence Fragment: Meg, Ella, and Tim (missing a predicate)
3. Sentence Fragment: In the lunchroom (missing both subject/predicate)

1. *Practiced the guitar* does not tell who practiced the guitar.
2. *Meg, Ella, and Tim* does not tell what these people are doing.
3. *In the lunchroom* is not a complete thought. It is missing a subject (who or what) and verb (what the subject is doing).

Run-On Sentences

When two sentences are connected without punctuation or a connecting word, it is called a **run-on sentence**.

Run-On Sentence: My favorite season is winter I do several winter sports.(incorrect)

Correct: My favorite season is winter. I do several winter sports.

Run-On Sentence: Mom loves chocolate she makes great brownies.(incorrect)

Correct: Mom loves chocolate! She makes great brownies.
